However, I am deeply concerned about the proposed windfarm on Benbradagh. As a business owner in Dungiven, I work hard to make my shop inviting to customers, and over the years I have become a successful destination shop. I regularly paint the exterior of the shop, and make sure my windows are always nice and clean. But what will be the point in doing all that, if you then go ahead and approve an ugly windfarm to be built on our beautiful Benbradagh. It would be entirely reckless for you to permit this windfarm in such close proximity to Dungiven, and in doing so you would be ruining our Benbradagh landscape, and indeed you would make Dungiven a **very uninviting** place to

come to, and not the attractive destination myself and other business owners have worked hard to establish

One could be forgiven for feeling, the council is giving with one hand, the beautiful Public Realm works, but then taking with the other hand, by potentially approving this wind farm on Benbradagh. I therefore strongly urge you to object to this windfarm on Benbradagh.

I, along with many other people who live in Dungiven, have a great sense of pride in Benbradagh, it is the identity of Dungiven, and to ruin it would be an unforgivable assault on our community, and on generations to come.

Therefore I strongly urge you to **please strongly object**, and to not grant permission to the proposed windfarm.
