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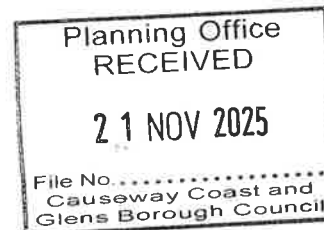
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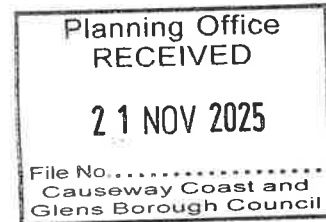
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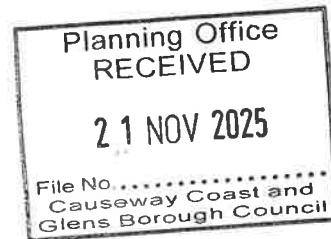
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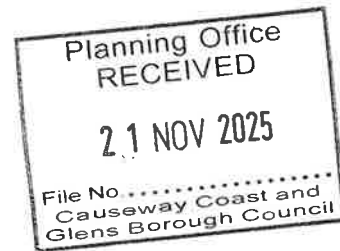
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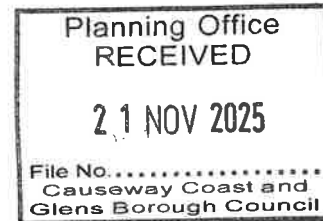
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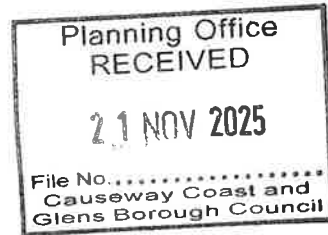
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This is a relatively small, four turbine, proposal which has already been reduced in scale in response to community feedback. The removal of two turbines means any views of the wind farm from Dungiven are no more than glimpses. The reduction also means the setting of Benbradagh is protected. Those points aside, the wind farm is being brought forward as an extension to an existing wind farm already in place.

I believe this is a reasonable and measured approach to delivering the renewable energy needed to meet the Climate Change Act target of at least 80% renewable electricity by 2030, and shows a clear willingness to listen to local feedback.

All in all, I hope the planning department and Committee will give this application the fair and timely consideration it deserves and move forward with approval.

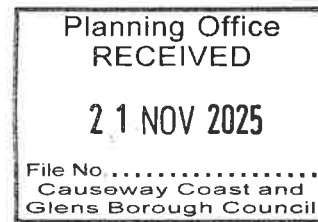

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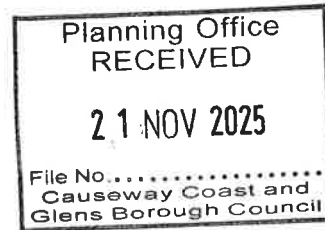
