HATE CRIME 2024

A hate crime or incident can involve people being targeted based on their disability, gender identity, race, religion and sexual orientation, and it can take many forms such as physical and verbal attacks. Over the last while, police in Causeway Coast and Glens have seen an increase in hate crimes including vandalism, graffiti, posters including threatening behaviour and even online abuse targeting individuals and their families.

With Hate Crime Awareness Week taking place in October, police want to raise awareness of the increase in hate crime across the North Coast, and highlight how it affects those who experience it and how victims can seek help and support that's available to them.


Hate Crime Lead for the Police Service of Northern Ireland, Chief Superintendent Sue Steen, said: "Hate crime in any form is totally unacceptable. It continues to be an issue across our increasingly diverse communities, and as a Police Service we want to encourage everyone to challenge this type of activity and encourage people to consider diversity as something that should be embraced and celebrated. There is no excuse or place for hate crime in the areas where we live and work, and people should feel safe.

"Raising awareness of Hate Crime remains an important priority for police, we encourage victims and witnesses to not remain silent, but to come forward and report these crimes. The more we understand the extent of hate crime, and the impact on those who experience it, the more effective our policing response can be.

"Nobody, no matter who they are, or where they come from, should be living in fear or be made to feel intimidated and we will continue to engage with our communities, influential and elected representatives and partner agencies going forward. Help is very much available and if victims report, we can sign-post them to the independent Hate Crime Advocacy Service who can provide them with the support they need."

If you are the victim of hate crime or know someone who is, a report can be made to police by dialling 101; or 999 in an emergency, or online at www.psni.police.uk/makeareport.You can also contact Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111. If victims do not wish to contact police directly they can seek support from the Hate Crime Advocacy Service.

INTERVIEW WITH LONGEST SERVING NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH COORDINATOR IN CAUSEWAY COAST AND GLENS BOROUGH COUNCIL

Causeway Coast and Glens Policing and Community Safety Partnership would like to thank our longest-serving neighbourhood watch Coordinator as he steps down from the position.

Taking a few minutes from his responsibilities Mr McGowan shares why he became a coordinator and why he would encourage anyone to consider starting a neighbourhood watch scheme.

Interviewed by PCSP staff Paddy was asked about his experiences:

Why did you start a neighbourhood watch in Portstewart?

I was visiting England in the early 90's and noticed neighbourhood watch signs and thought it seemed like a good idea to help local communities stay safe and connect. At the time I was a member of a local community committee in Portstewart so brought this to the attention of the committee. When we explored the possibility of starting a scheme we were told by the 'powers that be' that it was not possible. I think there was a fear that schemes like this would be seen as vigilantism and wasn't culturally acceptable at the time.

Thankfully this approach changed around the same time as the establishment of community safety partnerships and district policing partnerships (Before they amalgamated into Policing and Community Safety Partnerships PCSP) and the development of neighbourhood watch was seen as a positive crime prevention approach. Others and I were delighted to become one of the first Neighbourhood watch Schemes in Northern Ireland and I have served as a coordinator for over 15 years.

What was the positive and negatives in your experience of Neighbourhood watch?

I loved the sense of community knowina that and the scheme helped people in my community feel safer and I know it helps prevent crime. In the earlier days, we had lots of support from the local neighbourhood policing teams and there was much more human contact. There was a twoway support system established between us coordinators, the local community and the statutory bodies such as PCSP and Police. Resources have changed and a lot of the contact is now electronic which has positives and negatives but ultimately the aim remains the same; to be good neighbours, support one another and reduce the opportunities for crime.

Would you encourage others to become a neighbourhood watch coordinator?

Absolutely! I am sad to step away from my role however as the years progress there is a time for a slightly younger and perhaps more social media efficient person to enjoy helping their local community! I am now happy to hand the mantle over to someone else. I would like to assure anyone thinking of becoming a coordinator or starting a scheme that it really is not a huge commitment timewise.

Getting the neighbourhood watch signs up in the area gives peace of mind and reassurance that all our neighbours are activity looking out for one another given enhances community spirit. Studies have proven that Neighbourhood watch areas are less likely to be targeted by opportunistic criminal so for that reason alone I say... Do it!



SCAMS

Police in Causeway Coast and Glens are advising members of the public to be vigilant in the run-up to Christmas following continuing reports of fraudulent WhatsApp and text messages.

The scams involve a text or WhatsApp from a person claiming to be a family member, and have the common aim of encouraging the recipient to transfer money.

District Commander Sinead McIldowney said: "We are continuing to see this scam circulating. In each case, a person claiming to be a daughter or son, asks for money urgently. Typically, a family member is short of money or late paying bills, and asks the recipient to transfer money into an account, and we are appealing to members of the public to be aware if a message looks suspicious at all and to not respond.

"These types of scams are typically backed by a story that he or she has recently changed their phone or phone number so family members are unsuspecting, and in some of these cases, the victim has been careful enough to check with the relative and therefore realise it's a scam before departing with any money. Sadly, however, this isn't always the case.

"We are advising that if you have older members of your family, talk with them and warn them about this particular type of scam - this is a really important conversation to have. Regardless of what the scam is and the different methods employed, a common element shared by scammers is that they will go to great lengths to trick elderly people and take advantage of their vulnerability and good faith.

"Our message is simple – never disclose your personal or banking details to anyone over the phone or online, no matter how convincing they may seem, and never allow an unauthorised person to have access to such details via your computer."

Text message – Report suspicious text messages for free to 7726. Your provider can investigate the text and take action if found to be fraudulent.

"No area is the same, but community policing is of upmost importance to me and I am delighted to have been appointed as the new Area Coordinator for North Area.

"In the few short months since I took up the role, I have met with many teams across the North Coast and have witnessed how extremely motivated they are to work hard to tackle issues that matter to the communities we serve. These teams work under high pressure and the roles can be extremely demanding, but there are great relationships that have been formed, and I want to contribute towards that to collectively build on what has already been achieved here in Causeway Coast and Glens.

"My current priorities for each District in my remit, are to continue tackling violence against women and girls, anti-social behaviour and business crime. In addition to this. I will continue to lead the Hate Crime portfolio task and the teams to profusely investigate racially motivated hate which crimes have significantly increased across



North Area including Ballymoney and Coleraine areas. This list is not exhaustive however, and through close partnerships, shared knowledge, expertise and intelligence, we can prevent community concerns or address them immediately to keep people safe.

"In the coming weeks and months ahead, I will be engaging with our partners, community groups and local representatives, to not only discuss emerging concerns but to work strategically in partnership, to find long-lasting solutions to issues that are impacting people the most. I very much look forward to meeting all involved"
