The Mayor opened the meeting and provided guidance in relation to the audio recording of the meeting.

1. APOLOGIES

Apologies were recorded for Councillors Kennedy, McGlinchey and Schenning.

2. OUTGOING MAYOR’S ADDRESS

Outgoing Mayor, Councillor Callaghan addressed Council:

“Where did that year go?

It has without doubt been a privilege to represent this Borough as your Mayor. I would once again like to thank the members of my council group for giving me the opportunity to perform this role. I would like to thank Ivor Wallace for the advice he gave me when I took up the post.

On the night I was installed as mayor, I said I would represent all the constituents of the borough, I think I have done my best to fulfil that pledge. The mayor can only attend the events put before them; I can say that from day one I have thoroughly enjoyed the journey. On my first day I had the pleasure of meeting a group of ladies in wheelchairs who were part of the causeway giant's wheelchair basketball team, these people were inspirational, and friendships formed with members of the group will last well into the future.

I would like to thank the members in the chamber for the support they have given me, the atmosphere in the chambers has changed from the last term and I have enjoyed the more relaxed way the business has been conducted, I believe we have achieved quite a bit since the start of the term. It has been a pleasure to chair the meetings of the council this term.

The role has given me an opportunity to meet people I wouldn't normally have encountered. I would pay tribute to all those people who volunteer in the community in various roles. Some of the groups who work hard to help people with mental health and wellbeing groups like the Samaritans, ashes to gold, move more, age concern. These volunteers are at the heart of every community. There are many other groups I have had the privilege to meet whose volunteers work selflessly for others.

There have been many highlights on this journey, hosting the Duke of Edinburgh in Garvagh, being the representative of the council who delivered the freedom of the Borough on the NHS, and being a signatory on the growth deal. The trip to London with the Environmental Services team to celebrate winning Britain in Bloom and the achievement of the Bio-diversity team, and the success of the Ulster in bloom awards for Coleraine and Ballymoney.

Just a few weeks ago, the deputy mayor and I featured on an episode of escape to the country, which highlighted what this borough has to offer in an amazing way.

Following the fantastic success of this year's NW200, which was one of the best in recent memory, Council's events season is now in full swing. I have very much enjoyed being involved in the wide variety of events over the past year, including all the Christmas events, Halloween fireworks displays, the Auld Lammas Fair, Heart of The Glens and the Salmon and Whiskey festival in Bushmills.

It has been a pleasure to host the various civic receptions for the people who deserve to be recognised in their respective fields. Getting to meet so many people and shine a spotlight on their hard work, dedication and achievements is one of the many privileges afforded by the office of mayor.

The one disappointment for me, as a Royalist was the cancellation of the planned visit of King Charles and The Queen to Limavady in March. The visit was cancelled due to His Majesty's health issues, I am glad that he has resumed his duties and I hope he continues to make a speedy and full recovery. Not too many mayors get the chance to host the king in their hometown.

I said at the start of my term I would support the local food and drink producers in the borough, another highlight was getting the Giant Taste Causeway Food event into RVACC in March, this was a fantastic showcase of the best the borough has to offer by local producers. I have regularly visited the local markets and highlighted and promoted them whenever I can. The Salmon and whiskey festival in Bushmills was another great showcase for our local producers.

I set out from day one to show the working of the council in the best light possible, from the start I arranged that myself and my deputy would share the workload together. We sort of broke the mould by having the two chains on display at all the major festivals and occasions wherever it was appropriate.

I cannot thank Margaret-Anne enough for the support she has given me over the year, we have created a lot of memories during our partnership. The feedback I have been getting from public sources and members of the council staff is that this approach has worked. I believe we both worked hard to promote the whole borough in a positive light.

I am grateful for the friendship we have formed and really appreciated her taking over the diary when I took ill in March. It has been a pleasure to have worked with you, I would like to especially thank you for your help and support with fundraising for RNLI during the year.

I chose the RNLI as my charity for the year and I have been overwhelmed by the support and help both myself and the Deputy Mayor have received with our fundraising events for RNLI.

The final sum raised was just over £12k. Our events have ranged from sponsored walks to concerts and coffee mornings and on each occasion, we have been greatly humbled by both how much we raised and how many people supported us.

I would like to thank to the RNLI local team and everyone who has helped raise funds for Mayor's charity the RNLI, whether by helping to arrange the event or by donating food for the coffee mornings, it has all been very much appreciated.

I would have to thank many others who have supported me on this journey, firstly the events teams who have supported me in the big events, and their support in getting the 200 years thanksgiving service in Portrush for RNLI up and running.

I would like to thank The Council's CEO Mr David Jackson for the support he has given me during my term as mayor, our weekly meetings have proven invaluable, his advice and guidance have kept me grounded and greatly assisted me with chairing the meetings. The heads of departments and council officers who have advised me, including Richard Baker who has now moved on. I learned a lot from being a member of the selection panel for the new head of L & D and I wish Pat best wishes in her post and I believe she was the best candidate for the job.

Stephen Gamble and Leeanne Irwin deserve massive credit for the PR work they have done for me during my term. I would pay particular credit to Leeanne, who has battled with serious illness but still gives a dedicated service to the council's PR machine. I continue to pray that she makes a full and speedy recovery and returns to coming into the office soon.

I admire the press coverage that they have put out into the press and social media, and the assistance they have given me with speeches for the many events I have covered, considering the resources other councils have, they have done a remarkable job.

What can I say about Kevin and Stephen from McAuley multimedia, the photos from the events have been outstanding, they have captured the borough in fantastic fashion. I can honestly say we have had a blast over the past year, and I would thank them for all the publicity they have given us and the council across the globe.

Thanks must go to the reception staff in Cloonavin for their assistance in helping me setting up and serving guests refreshments at receptions.

I can honestly say that I could not have carried out the role of mayor without the support of the staff in the civic support office, Eithne Doherty and Sinead Duggan, Eithne's years of service supporting the mayors role is second to none and is a great asset for the council team, they have arranged my diary, provided speeches and kept me right.

I have thoroughly enjoyed this experience, I have so many memories and made new friendships and contacts which I hope to continue,

Last but not least, I have to thank my wife Ruth for her support and patience during this journey.

I wish the incoming Mayor and Deputy Mayor all the best for their term and hope they enjoy the role as much as I have”.

3. OUTGOING DEPUTY MAYOR’S ADDRESS

Outgoing Deputy Mayor, Councillor MA McKillop addressed Council,

“It’s hard to believe that we are here one year later, and I am handing over the role of Deputy Mayor.

It has been an honour to serve the Borough as Deputy Mayor and I have loved every minute of it.

I’d like to take this opportunity to reflect on a few of my firsts, which seems so long ago.

My first few weeks started at a running pace which set the tone for the full year.

It was a privilege to get to wear the Moyle chain which was always a talking point when you turn up as Deputy Mayor with a Chairman chain.

My first event was in the wonderful Owenbeg for the official launch of the Derry Fleadh. It was a fantastic event bringing GAA and music together, there was amazing talent on display.

a book launch by the talented Gerard Robinson in Limavady which was a lovely occasion and immediately put me at ease in the role.

I thoroughly enjoyed very much being part of all the major events alongside the Mayor.

If I was to pick some of my highlights throughout the year it would include:

- The opening of Armoy play park which was part of the small settlement restore and reactivate grant programme with kids from both schools.*
- The official opening of Dungiven Bowling club on a very wet and windy day.*
- Representing council and Moyle Twinning at Ballinsloe Horse Fair and I thank Alderman Hunter for attending alongside me.*
- It was a privilege to be asked by the mayor to come on stage to present my own club Ruairi Ogs at the sports awards which was a really special night.*

• I also attended Tom Mc Laughlin's book launch about his journey to setting up Redbay boats, and of course Tom is from Cushendall, so for me it was lovely to sail on his boat to Rathlin with the Mayor and Deputy Minister Emma Little-Pengelly.

Later in the year I attended the launch of the new passenger ferry service between Ballycastle, Islay and Campbelltown.

This will open up the wider Glens of Antrim, Rathlin and Causeway Coast to important tourism connections, encouraging more visitors from Scotland to Northern Ireland.

I enjoyed meeting people from across the borough at community events and the talent in our area is second to none.

We have fantastic local organisations including the Women's Institute, disability groups, multi-cultural groups, schools and sporting clubs, to name but a few.

Thank you to all the volunteers and community groups within our Borough your work doesn't go unnoticed and is very much appreciated by all of us.

It was lovely today, as my last event as Deputy Mayor to join Councillor Callaghan on this, the 40th year of volunteer week to hear from the volunteers about the work they do, in the lovely setting of Cushendun.

Thank you to the Mayor for choosing a charity so close to my own heart as Mayor's charity – the RNLI.

As a family we will never forget what the RNLI has done for us.

I feel very proud of the amount we have raised I would like to thank Conor McAfee and Shauna McKernan from Redbay for all their help over the last year.

Thanks to the Mayor for giving me the honour to be at his side on so many occasions and allowing me to assist him in a wide and varied role.

We set out to work together and be as inclusive as possible and have made our year about real power-sharing and shown that it can work.

I have to give real credit to Steven for his ability to show true leadership for the Borough.

He led from the top and the feedback we have both received has proved to us we got it right.

I have found Steven a joy to work with and he will be a hard act to follow.

Thanks to Ethnie for her guidance and knowledge and can I praise the other staff across the council throughout my term in office.

Many thanks to each and every one of you.

Thanks to my family for their support on many occasions which was much appreciated.

And last but not least can I thank my party for putting me forward and giving me this opportunity.

I also wish the incoming Mayor and Deputy Mayor a successful year ahead”.

Alderman Fielding addressed Council,

“It’s hard to believe that we are now approaching a decade of Mayors on this council.

This will be my final time to call you Mr Mayor. After one year as a Councillor, Steven, it appeared a seamless transition for you taking on the mantle of Mayor and from what I observed you were a busy and a very good Mayor.

Councillor Wilson addressed Council,

Councillor Peacock addressed Council

Councillor Kane addressed Council:

To Margaret Anne, our Deputy Mayor, I also thank you for your input, I always found you very approachable as a new Councillor in this Chamber. I thank you for your help, honesty and kindness. It was great to see how well you and The Mayor worked together. At most events this year, it was pleasing to see how involved you both were and it showed great teamwork on behalf of the Council. I would also like to wish you all the best for the remainder of your Term as a Councillor representing The Glens”.

Alderman Coyle addressed Council;

Alderman Callan addressed Council;

“Thank you, Mr Mayor, as your colleague in Limavady, I want to add my comments and echo what has already been said tonight, you richly deserve all the comments made tonight about your Mayorship. Over the last year you have shone through and have led this Chamber in a very positive manner and a good tone setter for the rest of this term. As has already

been highlighted we had a difficult Term last year and I think it has been a remarkable change in the Chamber.

I would also like to congratulate you on your efforts that you have done for your Charity. I had the pleasure of supporting you in your efforts including lugging bacon and sausages from the butchers down to your breakfast morning in Christ Church. It was well attended, and I know you had great support from the community in your efforts and I would like to wish you all the best in the remainder for your Term.

To your Deputy, who ably supported you throughout the last year, it has been a great starter for our Term and I wish the new Mayor and incoming Deputy Mayor all the best in their Term as well”.

The Mayor thanked Elected Members for their moving and touching tributes.

Mayor, Councillor McQuillan addressed Council:

As the Mayor of Causeway Coast and Glens Council, it is my privilege, along with the rest of you and our officer team, to represent this area and all it has to offer.
